Tunnel Vision

It took months of planning and fund raising, seven artists and 120 volunteers, but the first phase of Tunnel Vision succeeded.

The dedication of the five new bike path murals was held October, 2021. The paintings adorn the entrances to the Glacier High School and the Flathead Valley Community College pedestrian tunnels, and the entire length of the Glacier School Tunnel. Gallons of paint were needed to cover the nearly 5,400 sq. ft. of concrete.

More work remains however, with plans to paint the pedestrian tunnel near Lone Pine State Park this summer and anti-graffiti coating will be applied to the Glacier School tunnel to combat scattered vandalism.

Tunnel Vision is a cooperative public art project sponsored by Rails to Trails of Northwest Montana and the KALICO Art Center. The art center, headquartered in downtown Kalispell, began by advertising for artists. It received 60 responses. The choice of five was difficult. Louis Still Smoking and John Isaiah Pepion won the nod for the FVCC tunnel entrance with "The Lost Children" which was inspired by a Blackfeet tale. Grace and Sarah Washko illustrated the entrance on the Kids Sports. Kristy "Krusty" Overman decorated the tunnel entrance facing Glacier High School, and Madison Apple painted a huckleberry bush across the opposite entrance. The tunnel interior was assigned to a Bozeman artist Griffin Foster. His theme was "Fern Forms," inspired by the foliage of Glacier National Park.

Foster's project required a community-wide mobilization. Kip Smith of Rails to Trails rounded up the paint at reduced prices and solicited a local painter to spray a base coat on the tunnel wall. A team of volunteers followed behind with step ladders and rollers on extension poles to work the gray primer into the concrete. Then over several days in September, a rotation of volunteers showed up for the 'paint-bynumbers' phase. Zooming up and down the tunnel on his bicycle, and working just ahead of the paint crews, Foster spray painted the outline of each plant and marked them with a color code. Volunteers ranging from school children

to senior citizens worked in relays in the tunnel.

The "Tunnel Vision" project has been a lot of fun and a lot of work, bringing color and art to this valley's beautiful trail system. Thanks to all who have contributed and to those who will be contributing to Rails to Trails of NW Montana, (envelope enclosed :0) *— Rick Hull*

MDT is wrapping up the reconstruction of the intersections of the Alternate Route and Foys Lake Road as well as US Highway 2 and Dern Road/ West Springcreek Road. MDT and their contractors did a great job keeping the trails open during construction. We are grateful for their effort. Thanks to the involvement of concerned citizens, MDT included paved parking at the tunnel under the Alternate Route near Lone Pine State Park on Valley View Drive. Take the trail to just south of Foys Lake Road and the tunnel will take you under the Bypass to the trails of Lone Pine.

We have been working with the Flathead Trails Association (FTA) continuing our partnership to improve access to trails throughout the Flathead. This group evolved from the PATHS2 group that worked with Flathead County to update the County's trails plan. Member organizations include the local non-profits promoting trails as well as all the government agencies that wish to participate. One goal is to work with Flathead County to craft a policy that allows trail organizations to perform trail maintenance. This would include training and insurance to protect all parties. Contact your County Commissioners and ask them what they are doing to help.

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
